The book deduces from the painter's biography: a previously unexplored interpretation of the final argument with Gauguin; the critical role played by Rachel, la jeune fille d'Arles working in rue des Récollets, in the final years of the painter's life; Theo's role in quelling the scandal of the December 23rd ear amputation and Gauguin's ensuing arrest; The author underscores his thesis through a series of details in van Gogh's works, the painter's own letters, and by re-visiting well known events in his life. In Saint-Rémy, van Gogh had worked on a picture named *The Reaper*: "For I see in this reaper [...] the image of death, in the sense that humanity might be the wheat he is reaping. So he is — if you like — the antithesis of that sower I tried to do before. But there's nothing sad in this death, it goes its way in broad daylight with the sun flooding everything with a light of pure gold." [...] A few weeks before his suicide van Gogh had written to Theo: "Even if I have not succeeded, all the same I think that what I have worked at will be carried on. Not directly, but one isn't alone in believing in things that are true. And what does it matter personally then? I feel so strongly that it is the same with people as it is with wheat, if you are not sown in the earth to germinate there, what does it matter? In the end you are ground between the millstones to become bread. The difference between happiness and unhappiness! Both are necessary and useful, as well as death or disappearance... it is so relative - and life is the same."

Sie haben der Gegenwartskultur nicht nur Storys und Sagenkränze beschert, sondern auch Mythen, Ikonen und Helden. *Van Gogh* Steven Naifeh, Gregory White Smith. 2018 Voici LA grande biographie de Van Gogh, complète, magistrale et définitive, qui, malgré la somme de livres et de films qui lui sont consacrés, se lit avec un plaisir tout neuf. On y retrouve la figure fascinante du peintre maudit à l'oreille coupée, la vie d'écorché vif d'un génie solitaire et incompris, qui mourra à 37 ans d'une balle dans la poitrine. Mais pas seulement, et pas tout de suite : c'est là l'une des grandes qualités du livre. Contrairement à Pialat, par exemple, qui se focalisait sur les derniers mois de la vie du peintre, Naifeh et Smith commencent par le commencement. Sans céder pour autant à l'illusion rétrospective (où l'enfance expliquerait tout), ils nous montrent qui était Vincent avant d'être Van Gogh : le mythe (et le carcan) familial, les années de pensionnat vécues comme un rejet insupportable, la passion et la rivalité envers Theo, la première confrontation au monde de l'art, dans l'atelier de son oncle et la constitution d'un musée imaginaire, l'exil à Londres, la tentation mystique ... La fin du livre a fait scoop lors de sa parution, les auteurs remettant en cause la thèse du suicide de l'artiste. Après dix ans de recherches, en un tissage exemplaire de la narration et des citations, des événements et de la psychologie, du contexte historique et d'analyse de tableaux, les auteurs nous ouvrent les clés de la constitution d'une personnalité et d'une œuvre. Quelques grands thèmes prennent tout leur sens : l'abandon, la solitude, l'échec, la recherche éternelle d'une famille, d'une appartenance par Van Gogh, tandis que la disgrâce des siens s'installe et se creuse, les figures du voyageur, du semeur, du fils prodigue ... Les images, d'ailleurs, se superposent à la lecture et l'on garde en tête comme un portrait du peintre pour chaque époque : le gamin revêché, tignasse rousse, souliers défaits et filet de pêche à la main ; le jeune commis élégant et chapeauté, un carton d'estampe sous le bras ; le fou malade, amaigri, asocial de la fin ... Jamais bavard, d'une rigueur et d'une précision absolues, à juste distance du sujet (ni empathie excessive ni froide objectivité), c'est là le formidable récit d'un destin génial et tragique.
